Dear Friends;

Welcome to PRIDE '80. We feel that it is important for our community to gather periodically under circumstances where we can freely exchange ideas and information, find out what is happening and what needs to be done in other parts of the state, and to have a good time. As we are exposed to the issues and needs of every component of the Lesbian/Gay community, the eventuality of the success of the total community becomes more real. Each step in the process of individual, organizational, regional and state-wide growth makes us all that much stronger. That aggregate strength lessens the potency of those who would try to defeat us, and heightens our ability to achieve our separate and our common goals.

PRIDE '80 hopes to offer many experiences. This year we are presenting a series of SPECIAL NEEDS workshop sessions. Black and Third World, Younger, Older, Women and Men are some of the sub-groupings within our community, and each has its own special set of issues, problems and needs. This very diversity has often driven us apart, but through individual and group exploration of these differences we can, and must, grow together. Our Sunday series of workshops, COMMON GOALS, is intended to provide each of us with an opportunity to work in those areas where all of our issues are present. In addition, we will be offering workshops which do not necessarily fall into either of the two categories above, but should be of interest to most of you here. This year we are adding a new feature to the conference - the MINI-FILM FESTIVAL - which is our attempt to bring ideas to the conference which might not otherwise be available.

A few words of thanks are in order.

This conference would not be a success without the tireless work of the co-chairs of the PRIDE '80 planning committee - Mary Nancarrow and Rodger Beatty. For the past several months they have spent countless hours planning and arranging details so that we could all relax and enjoy the weekend. Aiding the committee have been several dozen volunteers: Sue, Beth, John, Woody, Milt, Glenn, Dennis, Roy, Tom, Steve, and many more who are, we hope not offended if we leave their names out. Additional thanks must go to several organizations, and their members, who have provided direct and moral support: The Philadelphia Lesbian & Gay Task Force; Central Pennsylvania Gay Alliance; Philadelphia Black Gays; Neighborhood Film Project; Free Women's School - Sister Cinema Project; and Omega Press, Inc., whose staff puts up with an awful lot each year to help the Network produce and print all of its literature.

We especially extend our gratitude to all the groups and individuals who helped us distribute brochures, raised and contributed funds, arranged car-pools, and generally supported the efforts of the Pennsylvania Lesbian/Gay Support Network. And, finally, we thank all of you who are attending PRIDE '80.

## GENERAL INFORMATION

### ABOUT THIS PROGRAM

The **PRIDE '80** program book includes almost all of the information you will need for the weekend. You will have received a copy upon registration. The index, on the previous page, tells you where in this book you can find details of each conference event. In addition to the schedule on the next page, a schedule will be posted outside each conference room, and there will be Facilitators stationed throughout the area who are able to give you further assistance.

Only one copy of the program will be given to each participant. If you wish a souvenir copy, they will be on sale at the information table, on Sunday. Proceeds will go to **PRIDE '81**.

### REGISTRATION

Registration will be in the foyer, and will be open on Friday, from 7 PM to Midnight; and on Saturday, from 8 AM to 5 PM. All persons must register and receive their badges in order to be admitted to conference events. If you misplace your badge, see the registrars. There will be an **INFORMATION** table in the registration area if you have any special needs or problems during the weekend.

### ROOMS

All housing at the Holiday Inn will be handled by their staff. Payment may be made by cash, check (with two peices of identification), or by major credit card. **PRIDE '80** will be held liable for any damage to rooms. Since we will, at best, break even on the conference, please try to be careful. You will not be able to make outside calls from your rooms, but a payphone is available in the lobby.

If you have any difficulty with the Holiday Inn staff, on any matter please contact a Conference Official (**BLUE** badge), and they will handle the problem.

### OFF-SITE HOUSING

Limited off-site housing, mostly in the immediate Harrisburg area, is available. First consideration will be given to those who have traveled the furthest and those of limited income.

### MEALS

You are responsible for your own meal arrangements, with the exception of the **ANNUAL PRIDE BANQUET**, which is included in the full conference registration fee of \$18. The Holiday Inn has its restaurant facilities on the same floor as the conference rooms. There are also a few restaurants within walking distance.

### BADGES

Each conference participant will receive a badge, which entitles you to attend conference events. **BADGES MUST BE WORN AT ALL TIMES FOR ADMITTANCE TO CONFERENCE EVENTS'** If you have any problems, see one of the **PRIDE '80** Committee Officials, they will be wearing **BLUE** BADGES, or contact a Facilitator, they will be wearing **GREEN** BADGES.

### SIGN LANGUAGE INTERPRETATION

Interpretation for the deaf will automatically be provided at the Friday night **KEYNOTE ADDRESSES**, the Saturday evening **BANQUET** and **ENTERTAINMENT**, and on Sunday for the **SUMMARY SESSION**. Translation for workshops should be arranged directly through the interpreters, who will be available at the registration tables.

### CHILD CARE

We will be providing child care during the following times:

Saturday, 9 AM - 6 PM

Sunday, 10 AM - 4 PM

Please sign up for child care at the Information table. Children 12 years and older may attend conference events if they are accompanied by parent. However, they will have to register and pay the regular conference fees.

### PHOTOGRAPHY AND THE PRESS

In order to insure all conference participants complete anonymity during **PRIDE '80**, **PHOTOGRAPHY WILL NOT BE ALLOWED** on the conference site. Members of the press will be issued **RED** badges, and media liasons will be available to assist them with picture taking outside the conference area. Also, to assure free flow of discussion, **AUDIO TAPE RECORDINGS** may not be made during workshops and meetings unless all persons present consent.

### EMERGENCIES

**PRIDE '80** will have medical personel on call. If there are any medical emergencies, contact any Conference Official (**BLUE** badge) or Facilitator (**GREEN** badge). We expect a calm weekend but if there are any unforeseen difficulties, please stay clear of the area where the problem is, and allow the Conference Officials to handle the situation.

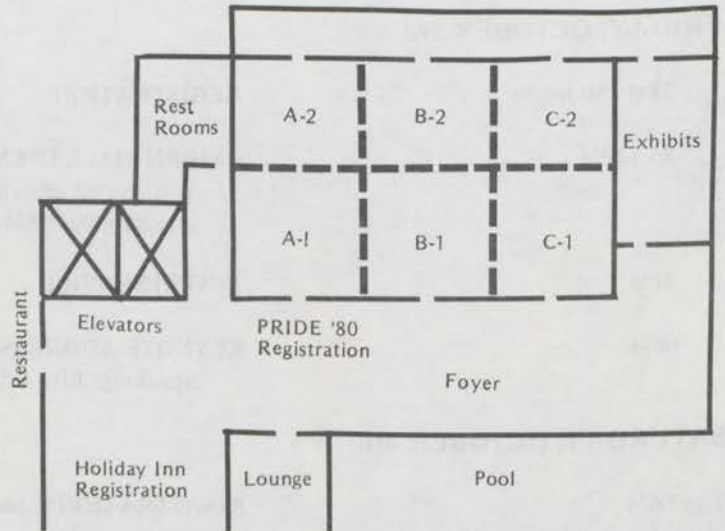

NANETTE NANCUSO

Tom has performed extensively at cabarets and conferences, bars and benefits. He has been writing songs since the age of 13, and has been involved in summer stock and college revues. As a result of Tom's Gay political experiences, his songs have begun to 'come out.' His recently released album *GAY NAME GAME*, has had steady sales for the last year and a half. He has performed at the Philadelphia Gay Coffeehouse, Gay Cultural Festival, Gay Pride events in Baltimore and Washington, and at the Glines in New York.

Nanette is a Lesbian/Feminist singer and pianist. Her work is enhanced by her distinct blend of voice and piano, which has successfully established her with many audiences. Her performances are marked by a wealth of original material, much of which gives insight into the person of the artist. Nanette has performed extensively in the Western part of Pennsylvania, including a remarkable show at this year's Pittsburgh Lesbian/Gay Pride Celebration.

# FILM FESTIVAL

## THE FILMS

### IN THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE CHILDREN A film about Lesbian mothers and child custody

by Iris Films/Iris Feminist Collective, Inc., 1977, 53 min., color

Eight Lesbian mothers talking of their experiences as Lesbians and mothers. They make statements that show them both to be the same as, and different than other mothers. Their children are shown in interaction with their mothers, and in a rap group with each other discussing how their mothers are different, how they feel about the court's right to decide where they will live, and what they think about their own sexuality.\*

### A COMEDY IN SIX UNNATURAL ACTS

by Jan Oxenberg, 1975, 25 min., black & white

The film is a loving satire of the stereotyped images of Lesbians including the wallflower, stompin' dyke, child molester, role player, seductress, and the nonmonogamous "right-on" sister. Each scene is filmed in a style which is also a spoof on a different genre from the history of Hollywood films from silent movie style to a chorus line production number — the films which have formed so many of our stereotypes.\*

### GAY, PROUD & SOBER

by Jesus Trevino & others, 1977, 21 min., color

An exploration of the problems of alcoholism in the Lesbian/Gay community. The experiences of Lesbian & Gay alcoholics, as well as those from Lesbian/Gay alcoholism treatment professionals, paint a vivid picture of this all too pervasive disease. Most importantly, the film shows that there is hope, and Lesbians and Gays need not lead useless lives as alcoholics.†

### HOME MOVIE

by Jan Oxenberg, 1978, 12 min., color

HOME MOVIE is an autobiographical film about lesbianism. It combines current documentary footage of the lesbian community with actual old home movies of the filmmaker as a young child imitating her mother and as a high school cheerleader. The sound track includes original music and a moving, personal narration about growing up as a lesbian and the experience of coming out.\*

### WHO HAPPEN TO BE GAY

by Dale Beldin & Mark Krenzien, 1979, 23 min., color

This highly acclaimed ABC Television documentary profiles six professionals who have decided to lead openly gay lives. The occupations of the three men and three women are an engineer, a college professor, a psychologist, a registered nurse, a real estate agent and a doctor.\*\*
