Bill Horn asked the uspport of the Caucus in regards to his recent dismissal from the Fredway Resort Inn in Lancaster. Bill explained that he was invited to attend a function at the Freadway as the date of one of the employees of the firm that was having the function. He was given permission from his immediate supervisor to attend the function who knew that he would be dressed in drag.

The next day Bill received a notice of improper attire which is one of the restriction place on employees while on the premises whether on duty or not. The person who gave Bill permission was forced to sign the notice against his wishes saying that he wasn't given permission to attend. This was the second notice that Bill received. He received his first notice shortly after starting there for breaking a tray of dishes. The third notice was for arriving late to work even though he called to say that he would be late. Agter three notices you can be dismissed at any time.

## SENATO BILL #83

On Teusday, February 22, Sonate Bill #83 passed in State Government Countities by a vote of 8 to 3 and is being returned to the Senate Floor for consideration. The history of that day follows:

Harry Lenghorne of Philadelphi was the terson who tissed off the Pa. Gys that the Bill would be considered at the Counttee meeting on the Band. He had sected senator Suith the Thursday before about a planned de a fration at Suith's Philadelphia office against SB #83. During the call, he asked to be informed when the Bill would be considered by the State Government Counttee which Senator Suith chairs. Within an hour, Suith a lied back to tell Harry that it was scheduled for Tuesday. The Senate Counttee had not yet even a nounced the meeting to its own members.

Also during debate on the Bill, our friend Senator Louis Hill offered an emendment to have the word, homosexual, removed. This notion lost along the same lines as the final vote. Senators Louis Hill, Paul McKinney, and Edward Howard voted for the notion, which lost. Also, a noti n to remove probation officers from the persons included in the bill passed by unmimous, and
